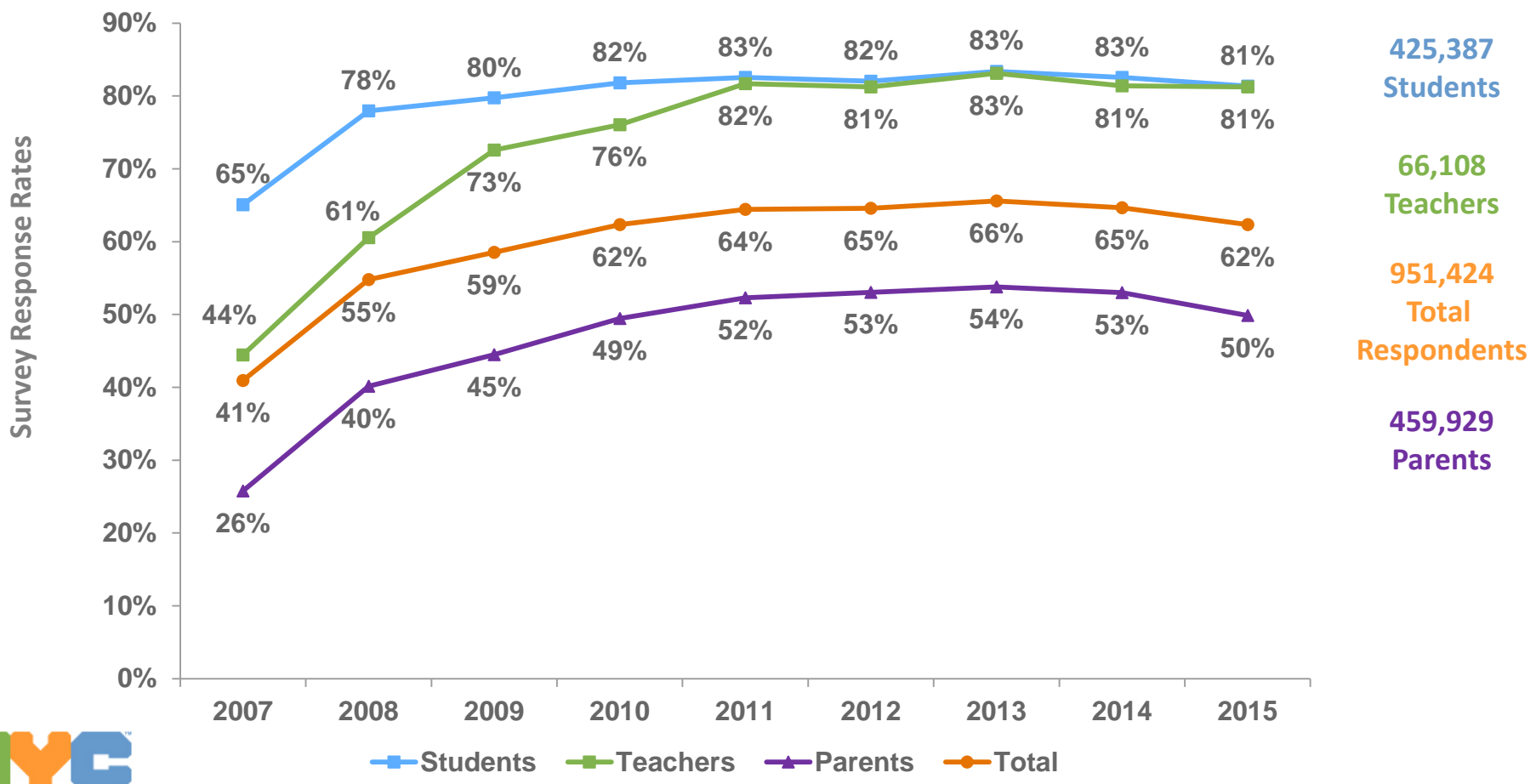

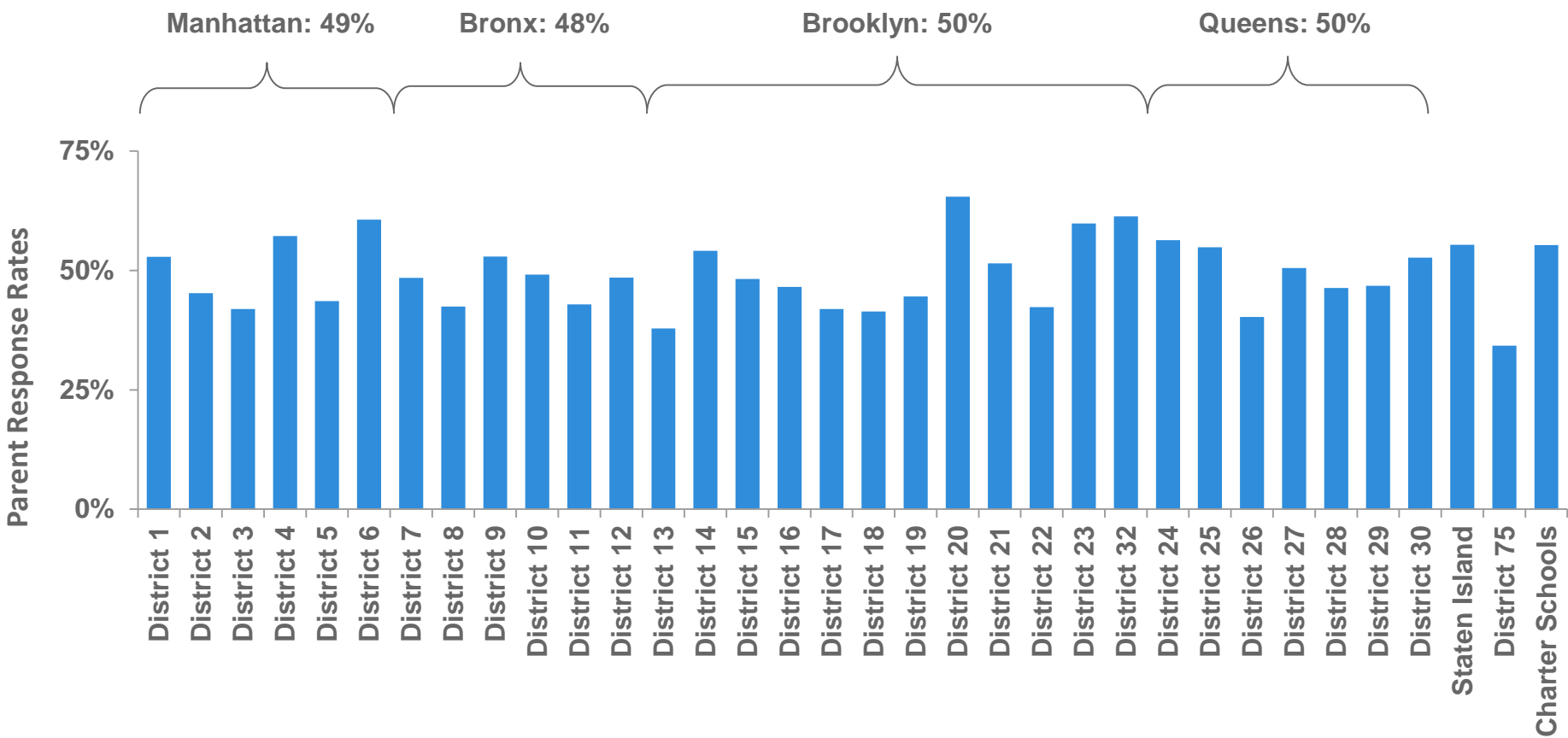

NYC School Survey participation remained high with nearly one million respondents

Over 350,000 more constituents responded this year than in 2007 when the Survey was first administered

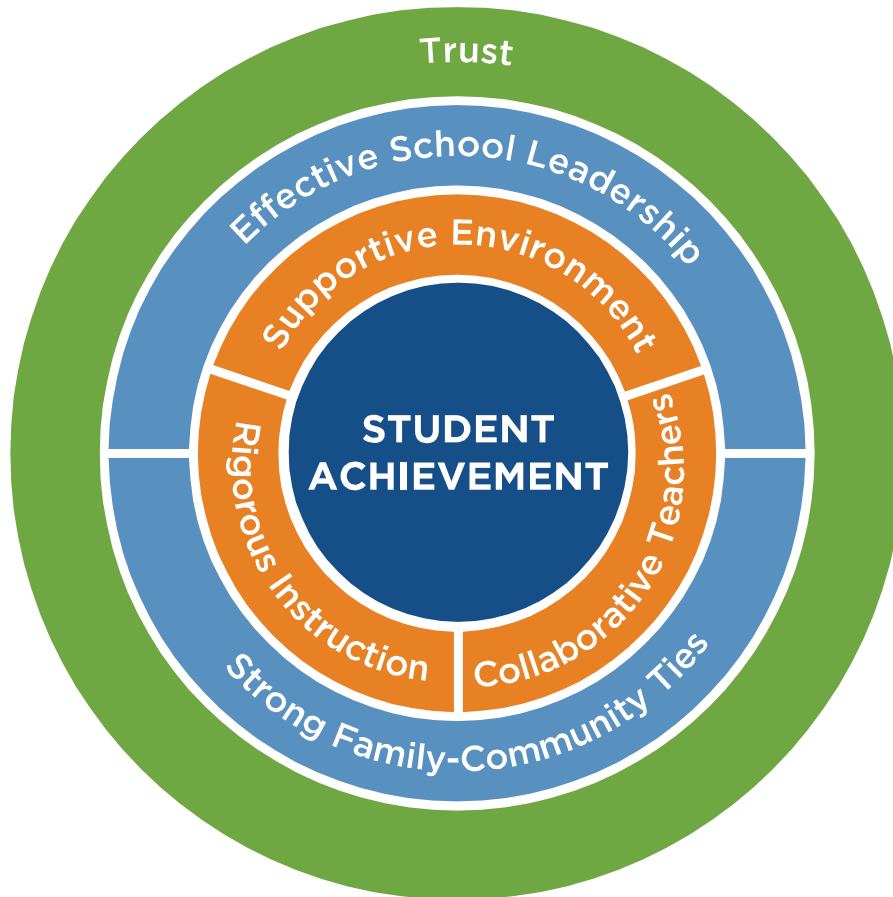


Parent survey participation remained high across boroughs



Staten Island: 55%
 District 75: 34%
 Charter Schools: 55%

This year, the survey was revised to solicit feedback across the six elements of the Framework for Great Schools



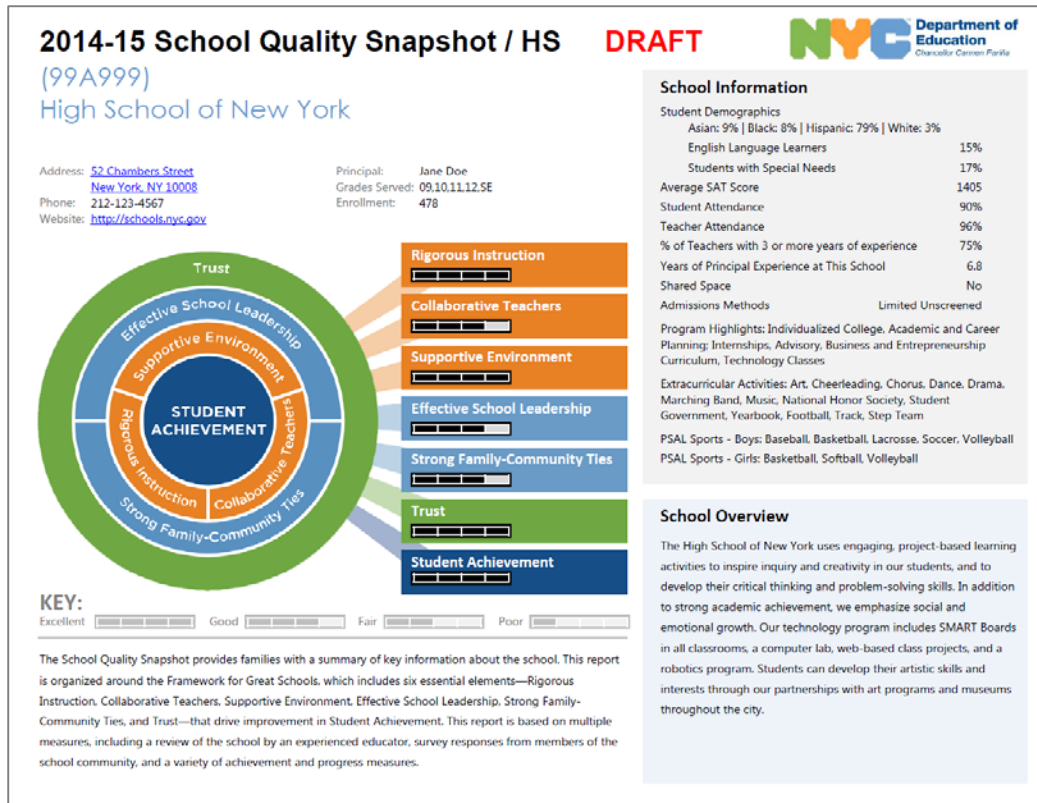
- Based on robust research, the six elements of the Framework for Great Schools identify the areas that must improve to increase student achievement.
- By focusing attention and resources on what it takes for schools to function well, the Framework identifies the underlying strengths and weaknesses of a school and shows community members concrete ways to improve student achievement.

Examples of Framework Aligned Survey Questions

Element	Survey Item
Rigorous Instruction	> I learn a lot from feedback on my work. (S)
Supportive Environment	> The teachers at this school notice when I am upset or having emotional difficulty. (S)
Collaborative Teachers	> Teachers in this school share/discuss students' work with other teachers. (T)
Effective School Leadership	> The principal at this school sets high standards for student learning. (T)
Strong Family-Community Ties	> School staff encourage feedback from parents/guardians and the community. (P)
Trust	> Staff at this school work hard to build trusting relationships with parents/guardians like me. (P)

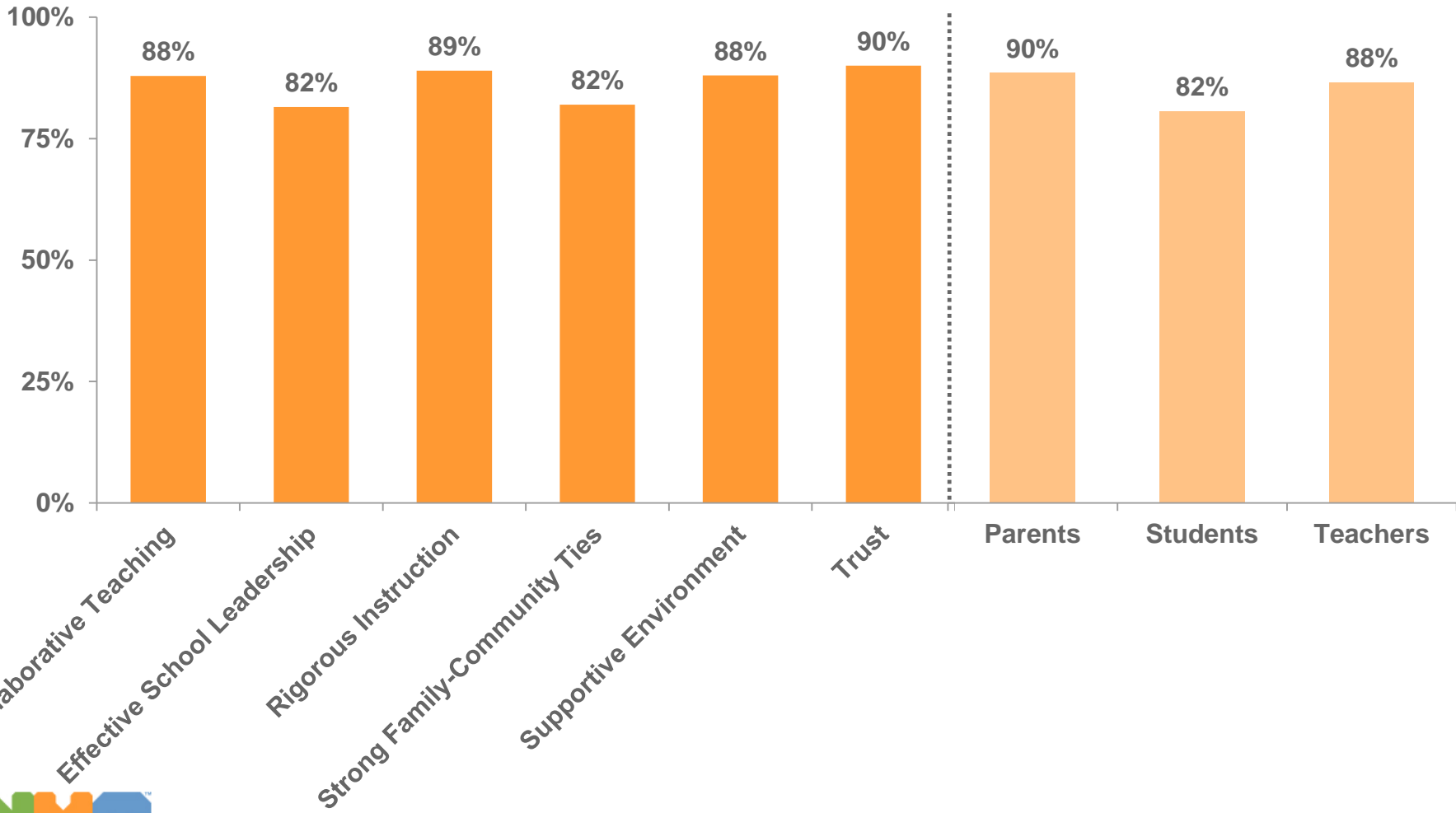

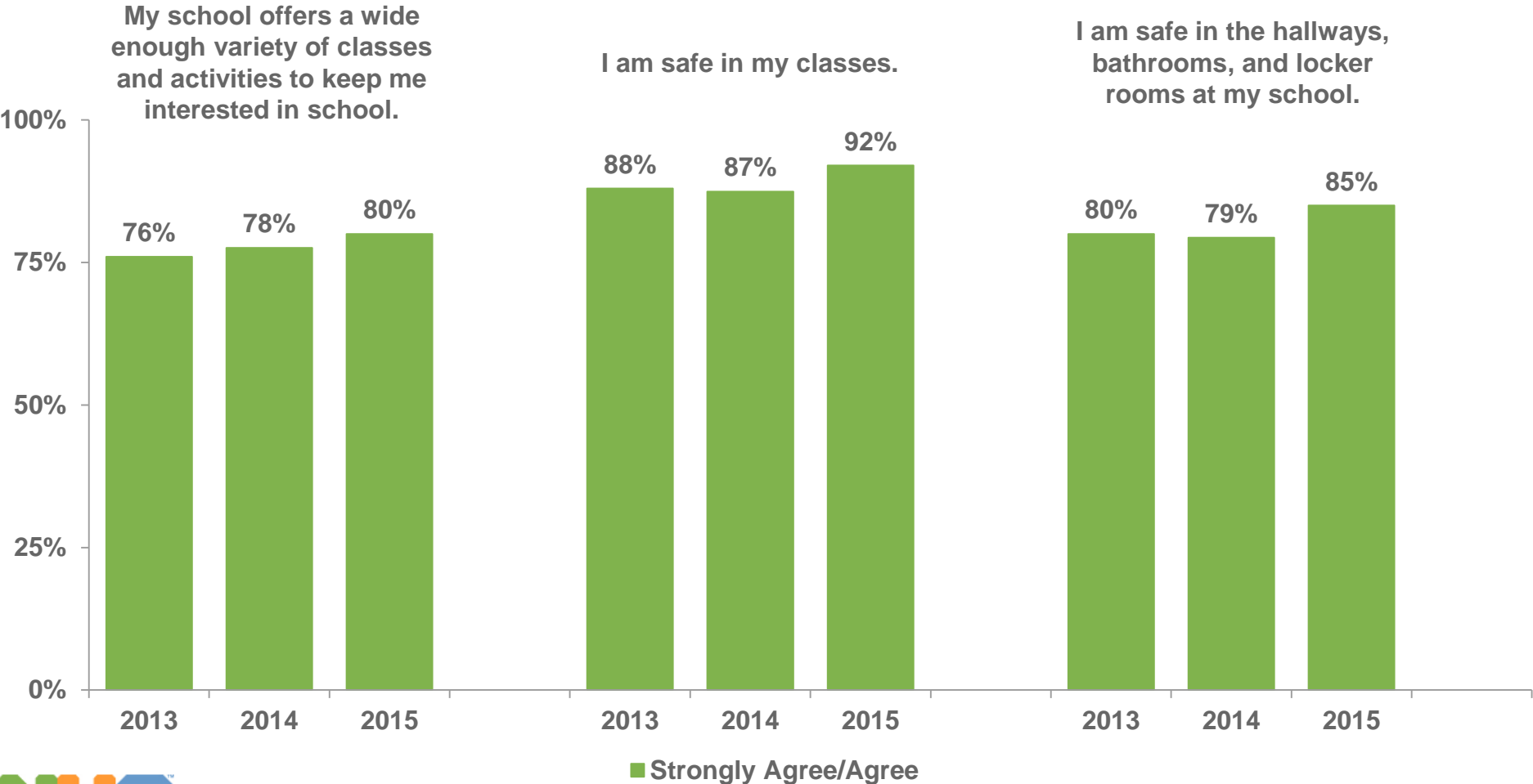


- Building on changes from last year — the reports move beyond test scores, with increased emphasis on school practices and environment.
- Reports now align to the Framework to provide a clear picture of each school’s strengths and areas of growth in each element.
- Reports are designed to foster collaborative conversations about school improvement between school leaders and school communities.

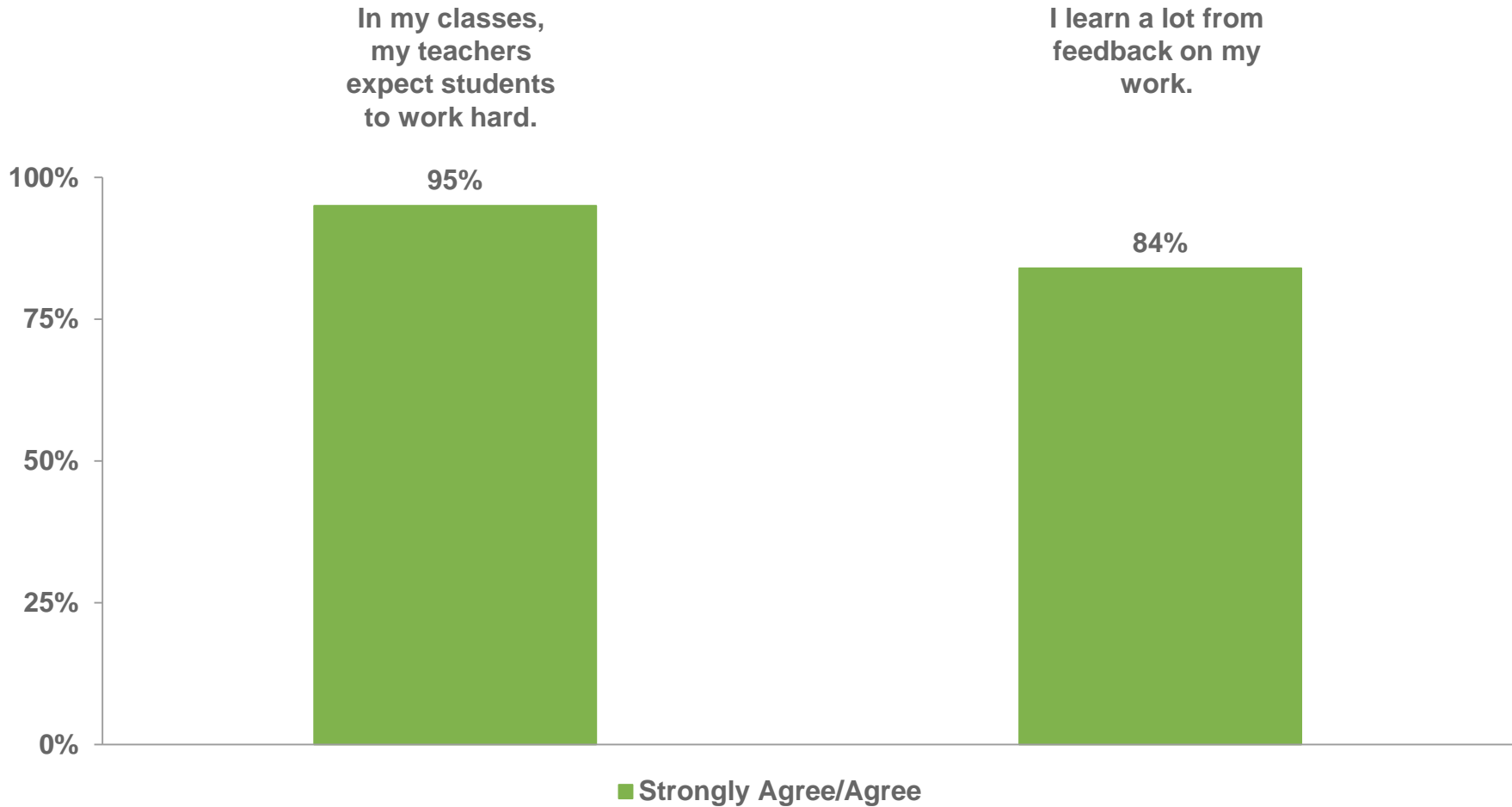
Satisfaction was high across all six Framework elements and the three respondent groups



Students expressed high levels of satisfaction in key areas



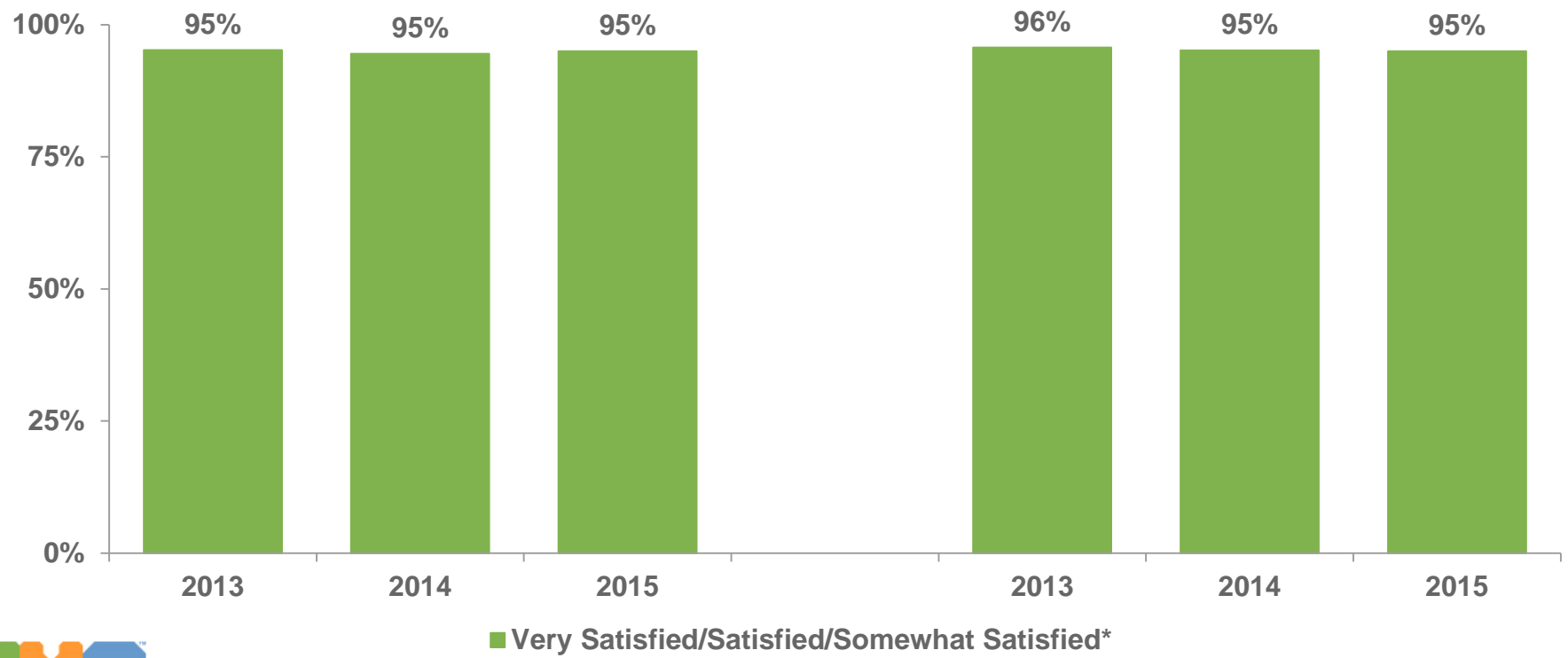
Students were asked new survey questions that are aligned to the Framework for Great Schools



Parents continue to indicate high levels of satisfaction with schools

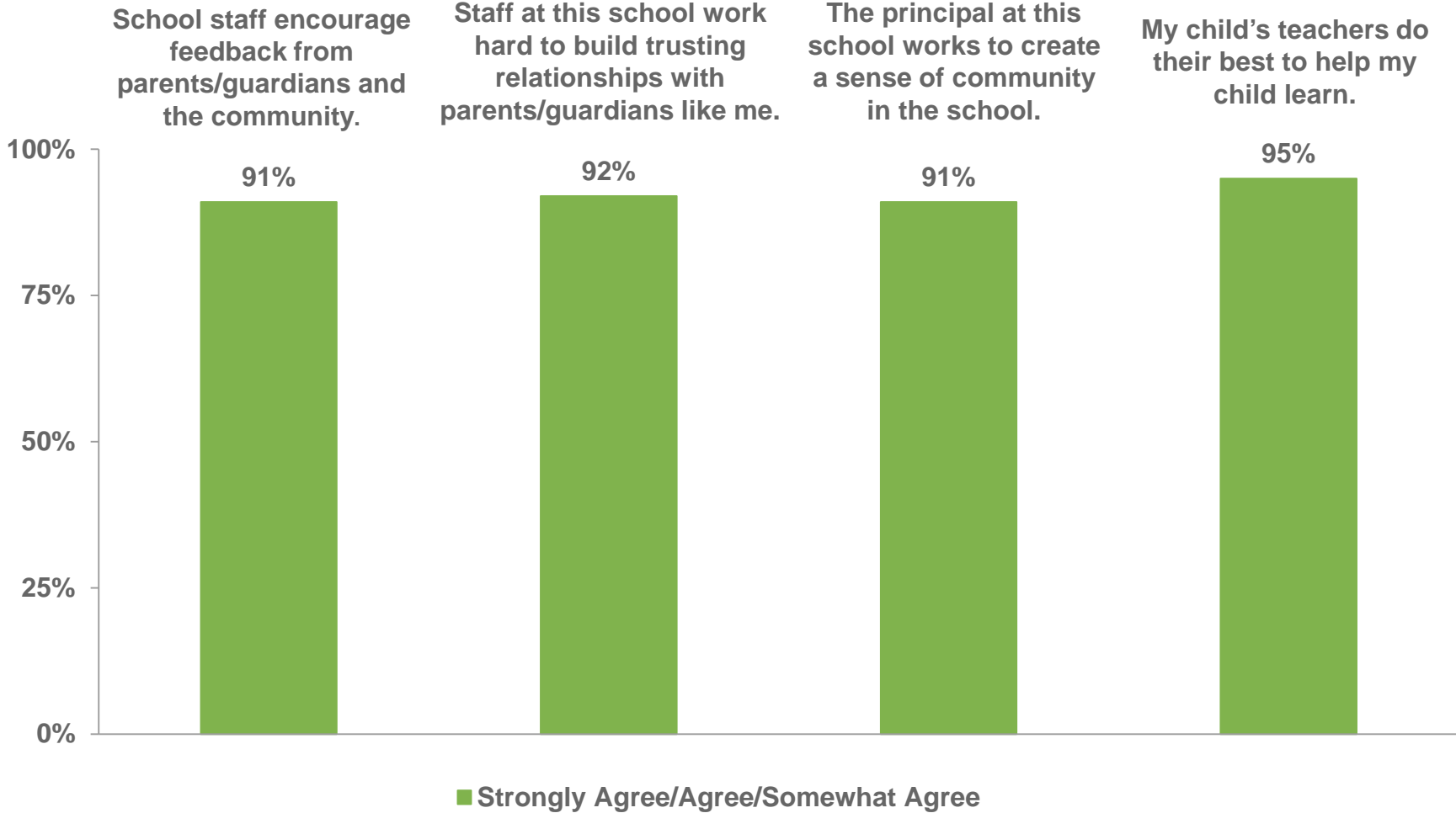
I am satisfied with the education my child has received this year.

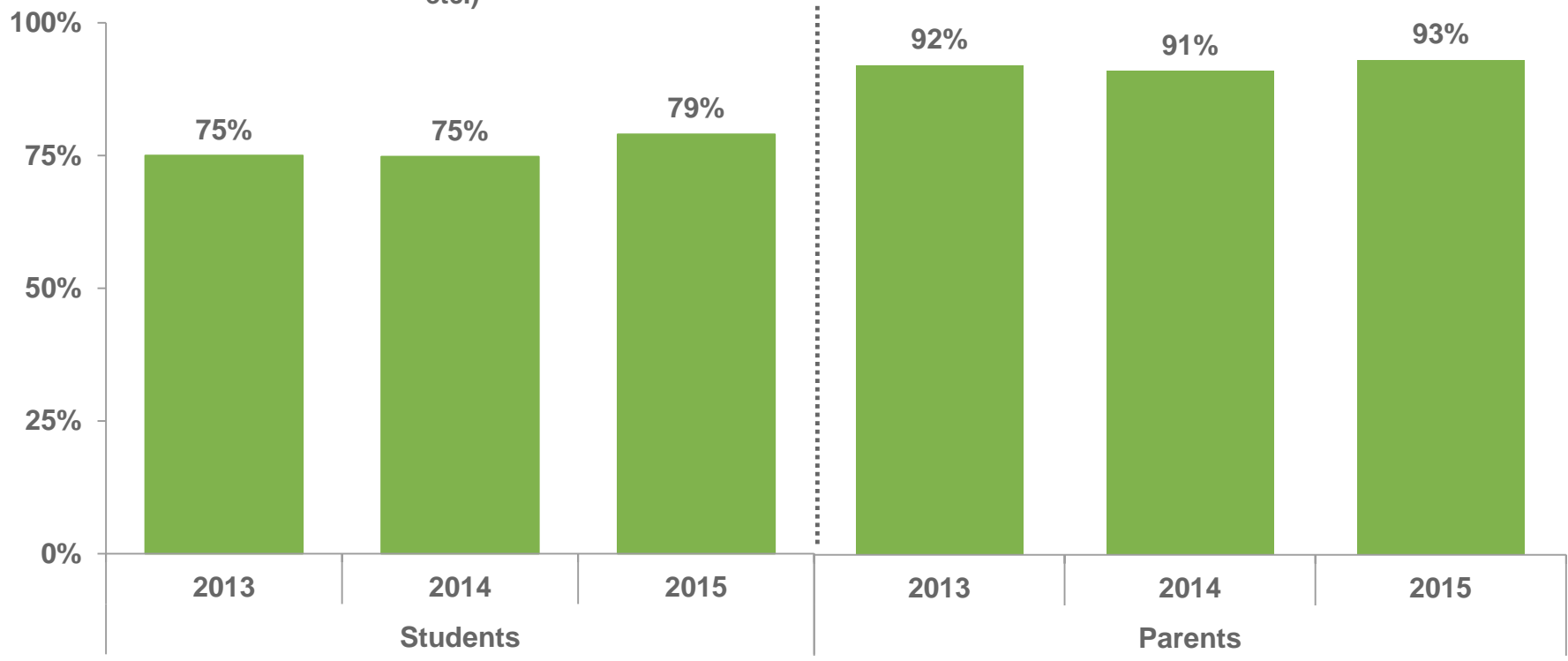

My child's school helps keep my child on track for college, career, and success in life after high school.

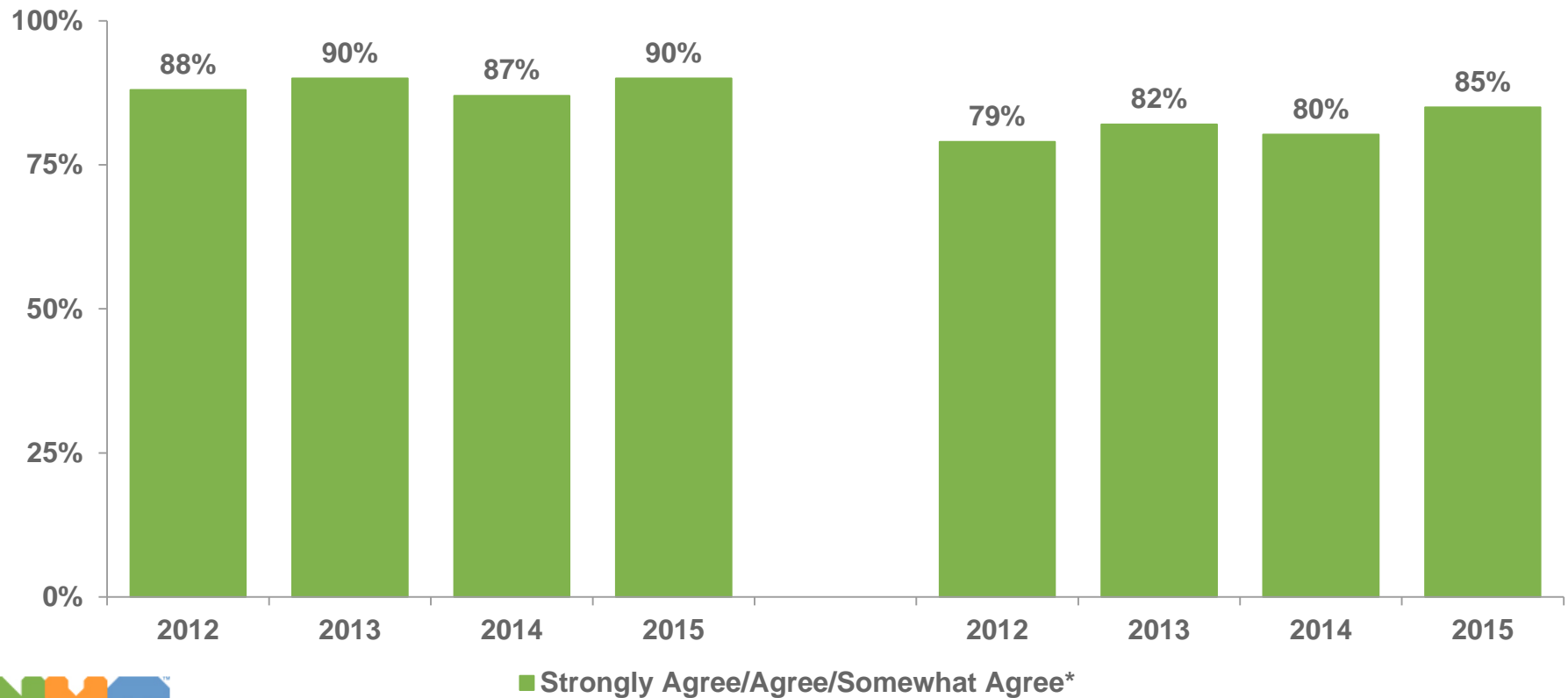

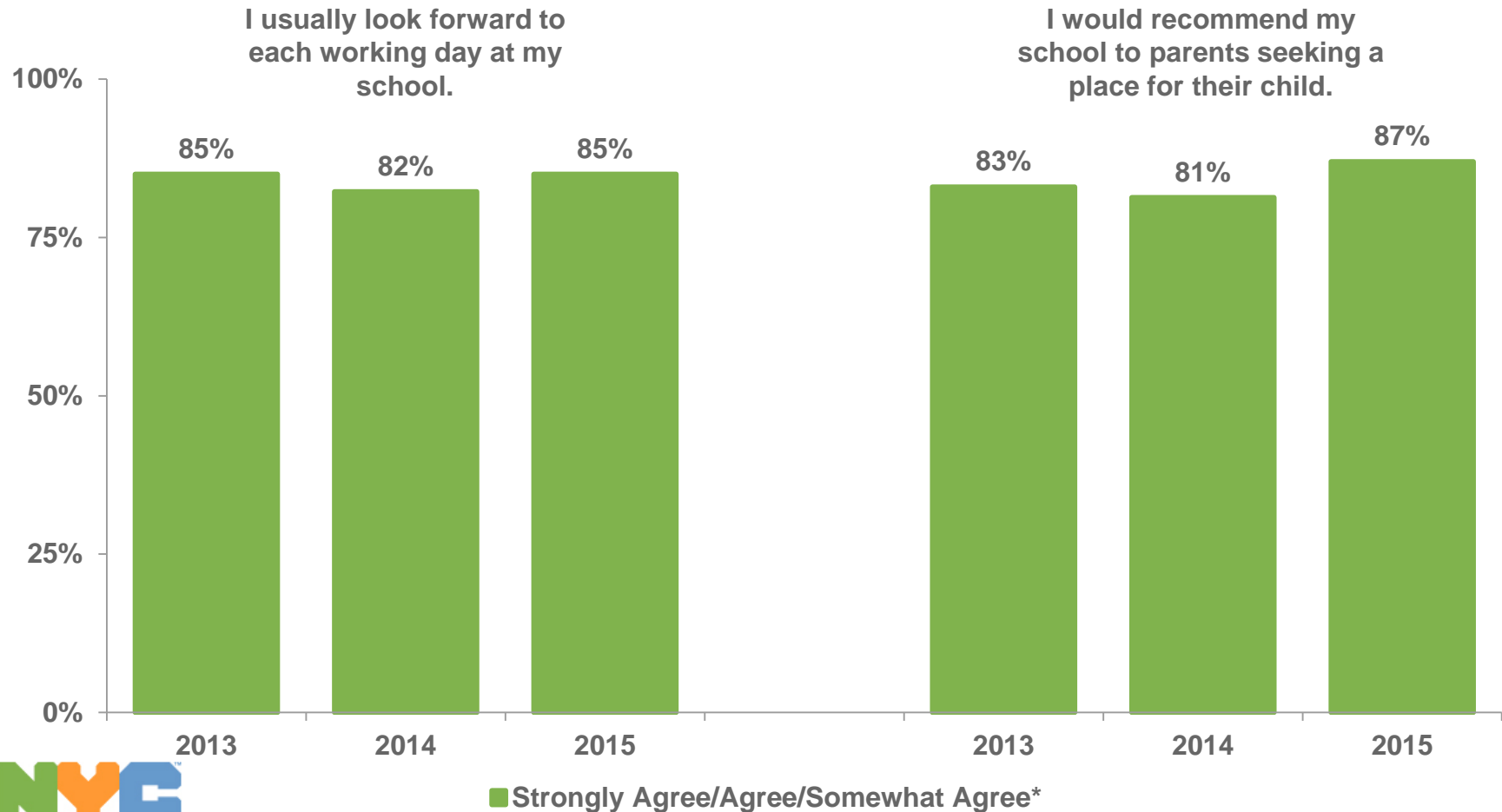
Teachers continue to report high levels of satisfaction with the learning environment in their schools

Order and discipline are maintained at my school.



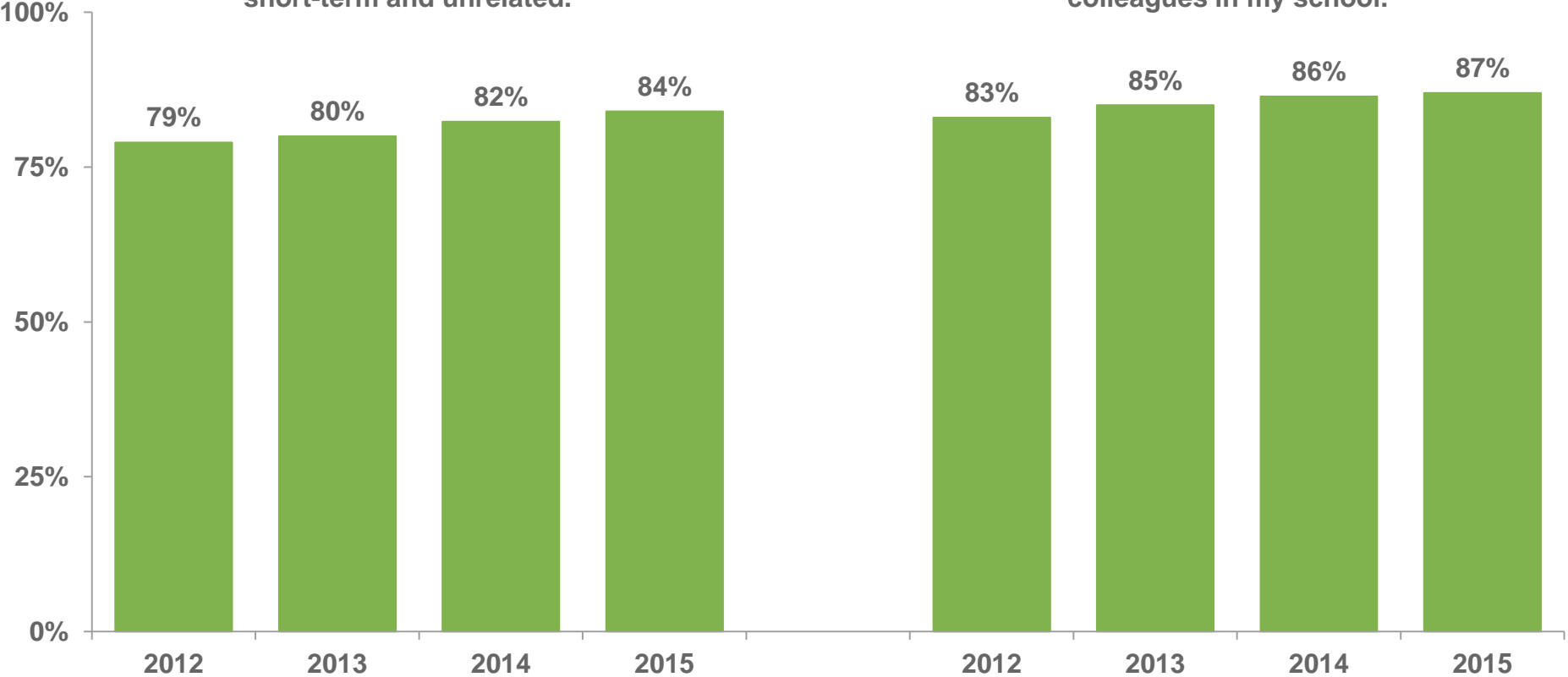
An increased number of teachers report looking forward to each working day at their schools and would recommend their schools to parents

Professional development experiences this school year have been sustained and coherently focused, rather than short-term and unrelated.

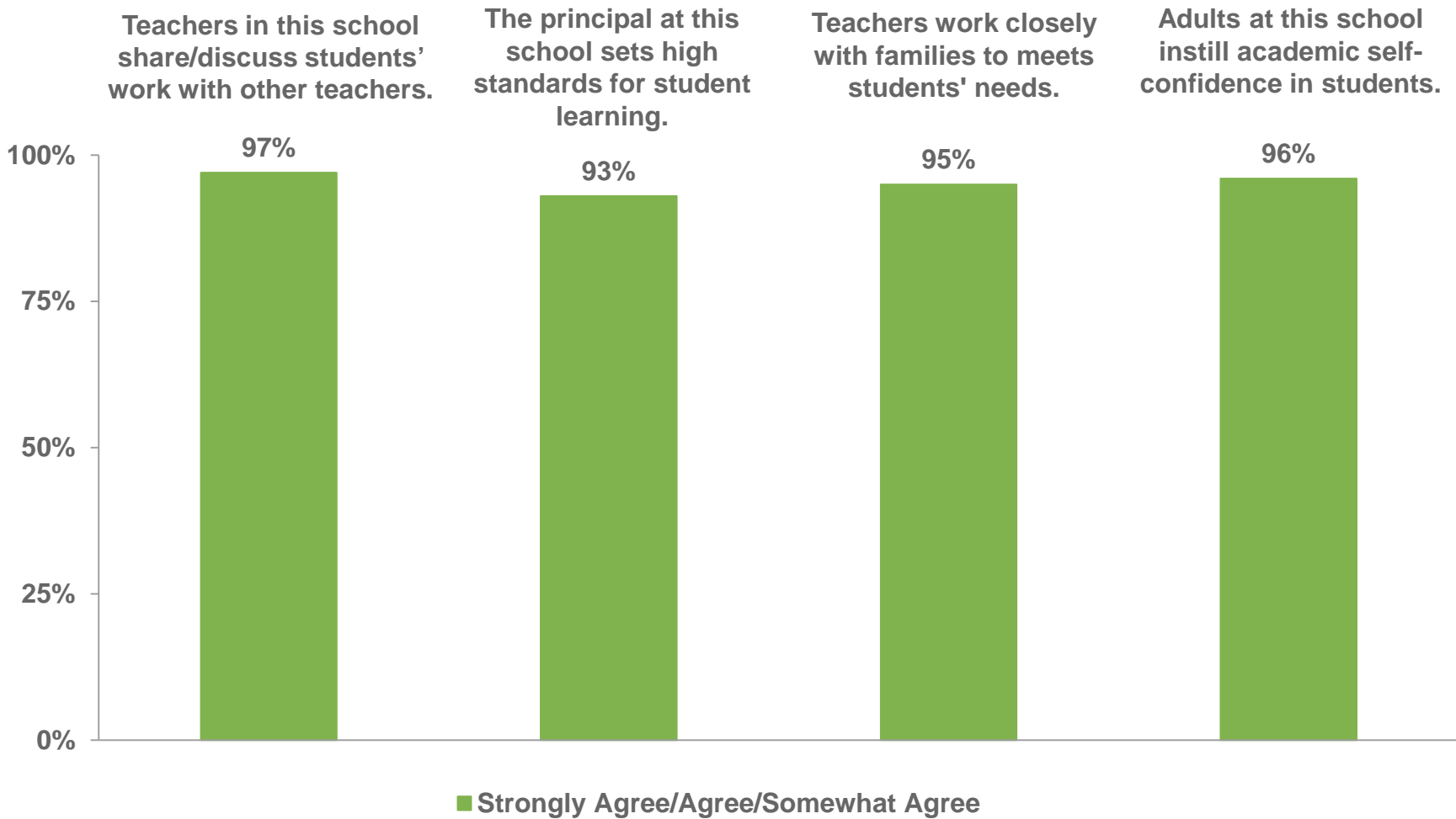
Professional development experiences this school year have included opportunities to work productively with colleagues in my school.

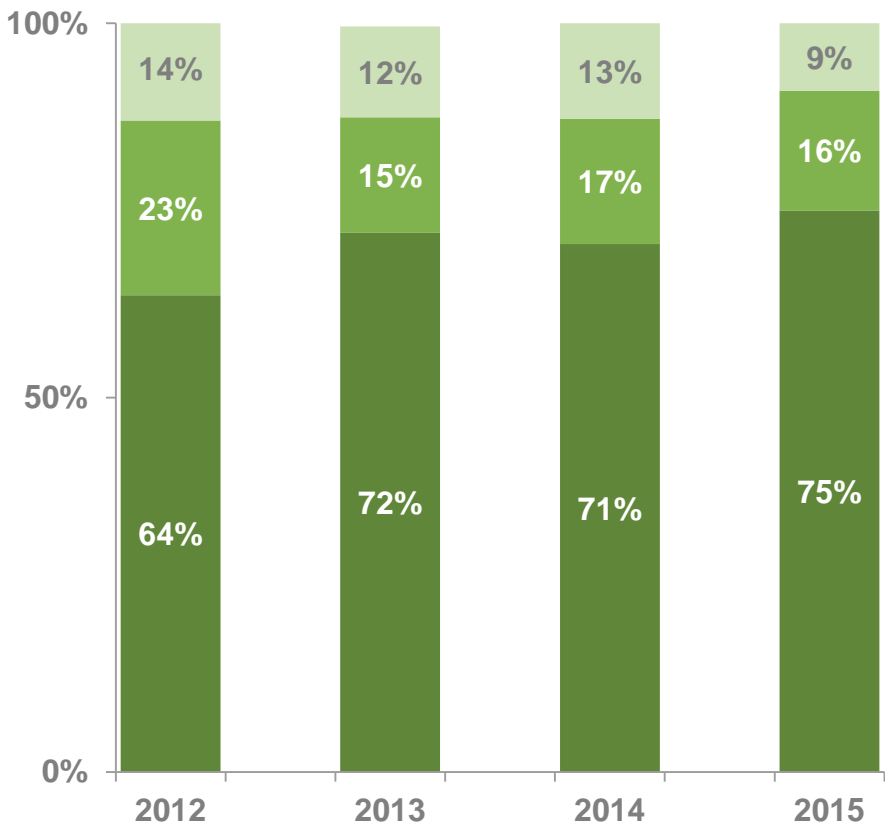

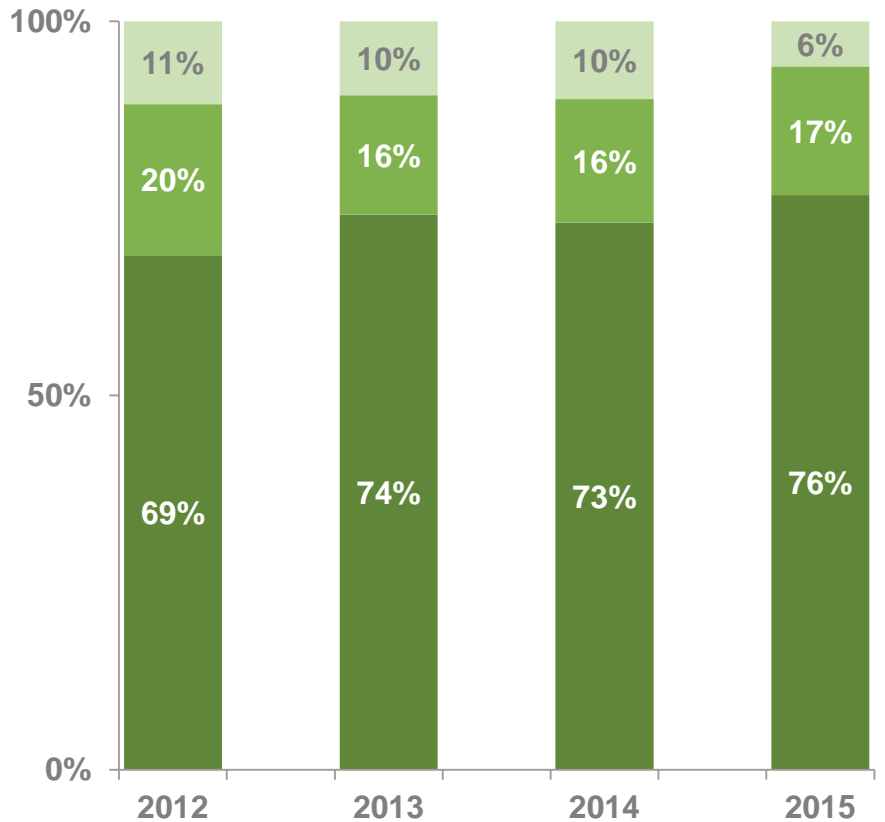


Most parents are satisfied with the Schools Chancellor and the Panel for Education Policy

Satisfaction with the Schools Chancellor



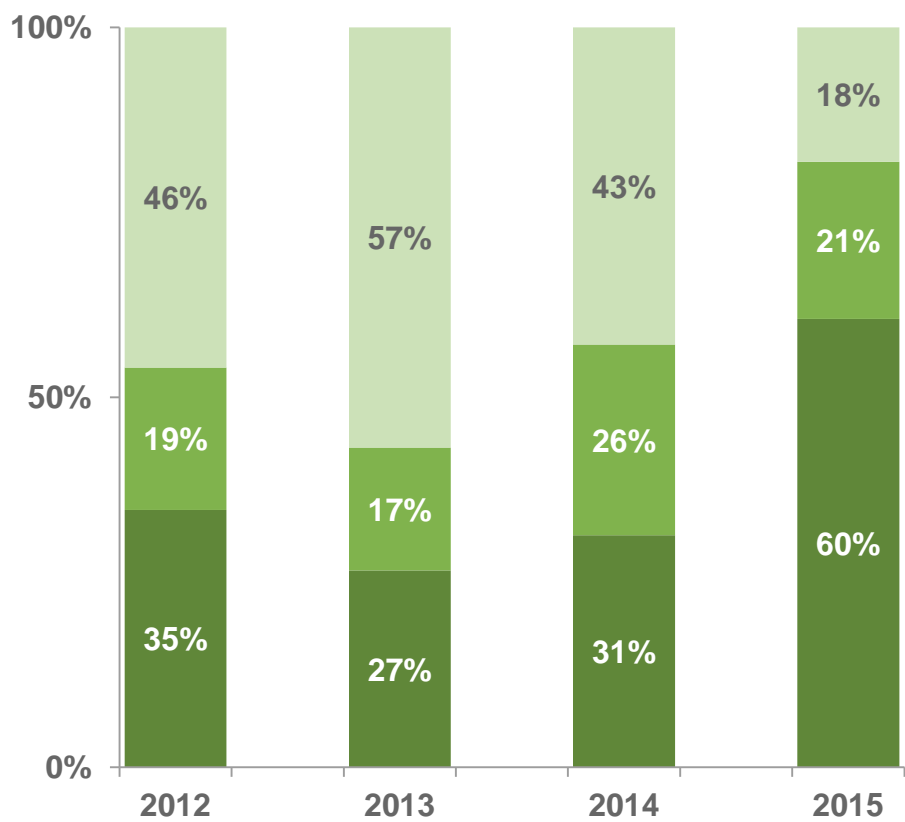
Satisfaction with the Panel for Education Policy



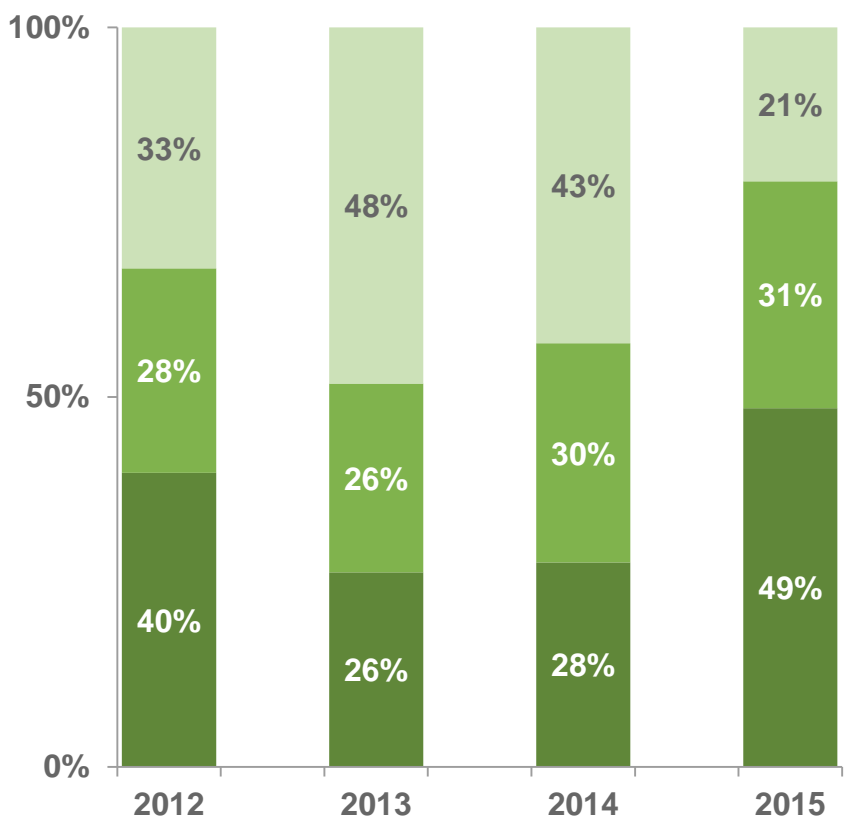
