SAT Participation for Juniors in NYC

In March 2016, New York City piloted a free SAT administration during the school day for juniors in 91 schools and in March 2017 the SAT was made available free of charge to all juniors.

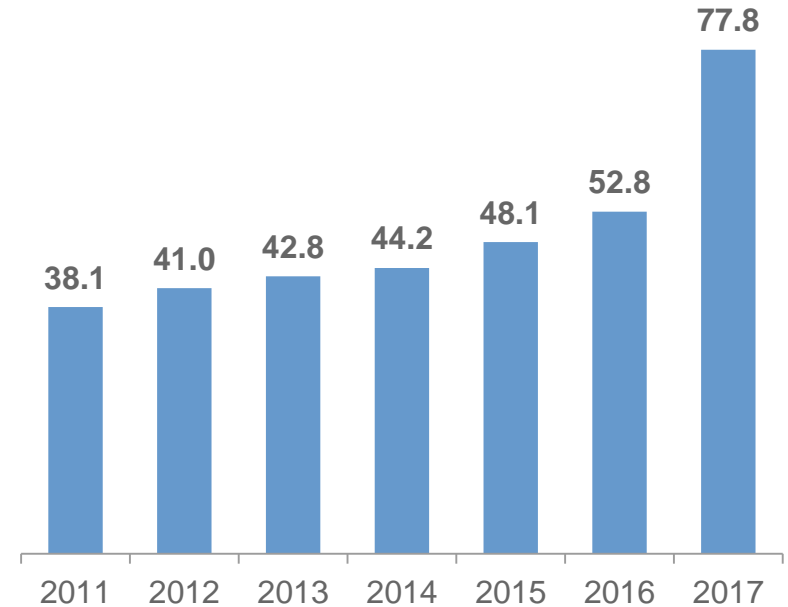
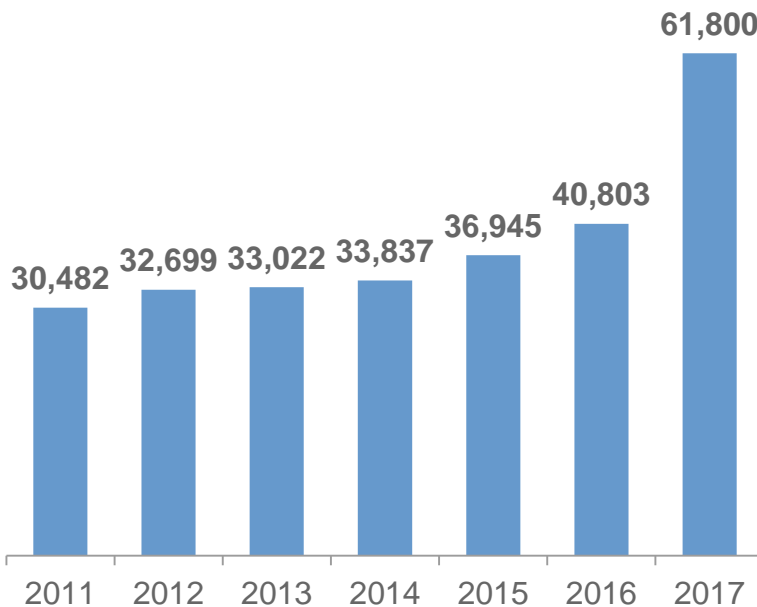

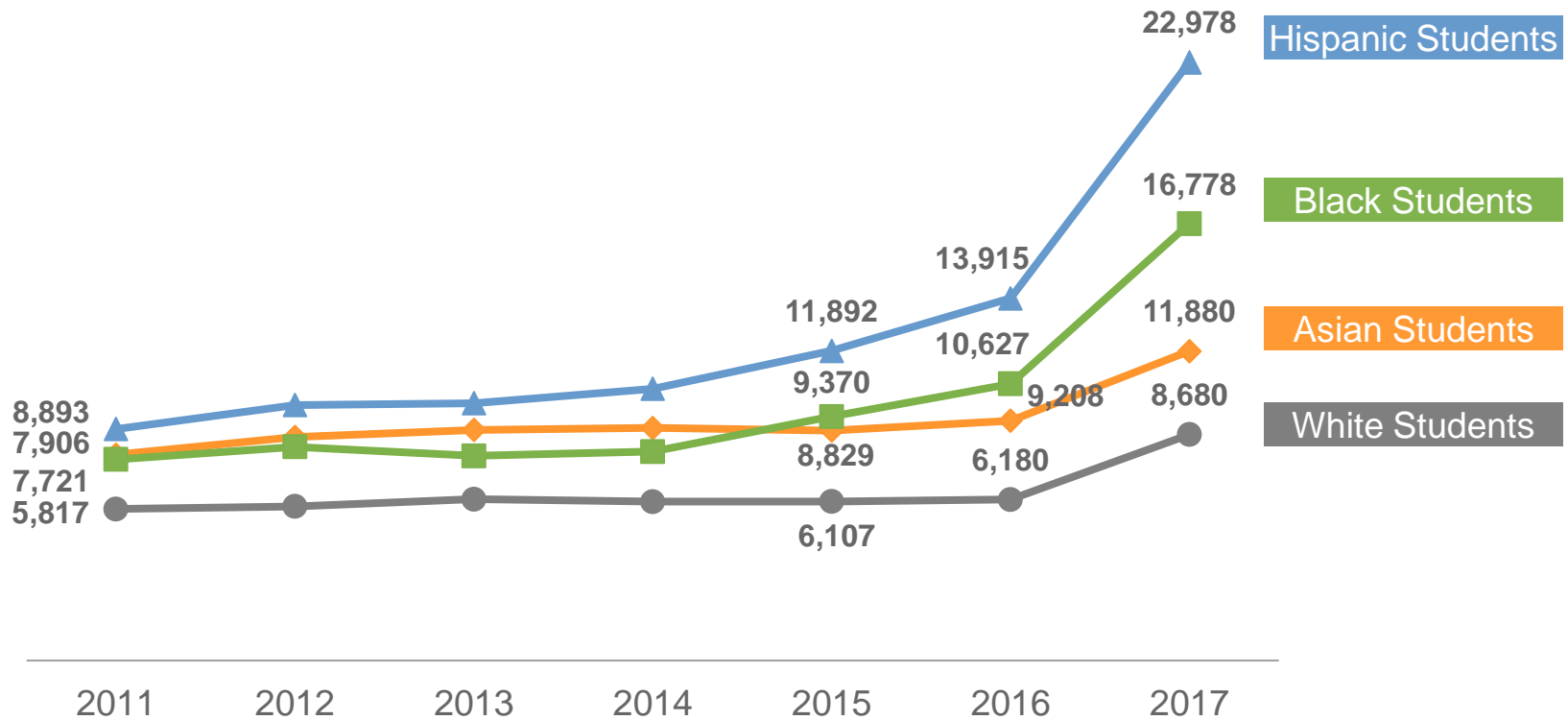

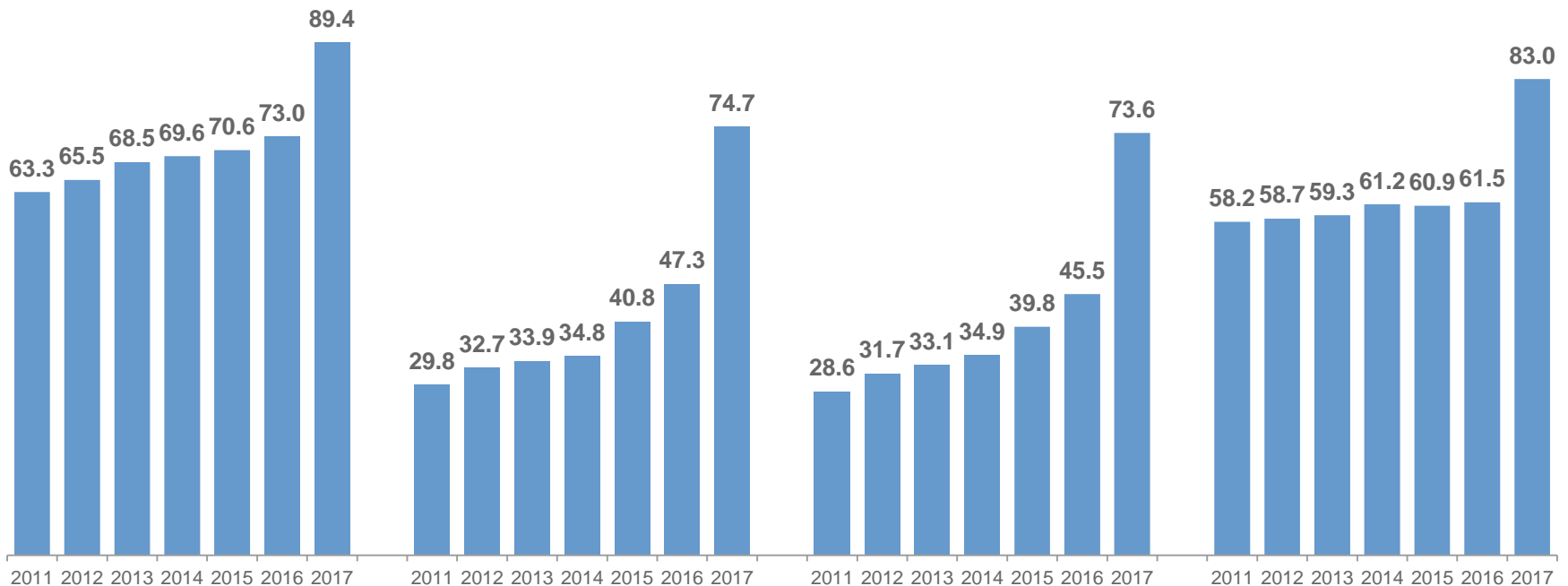

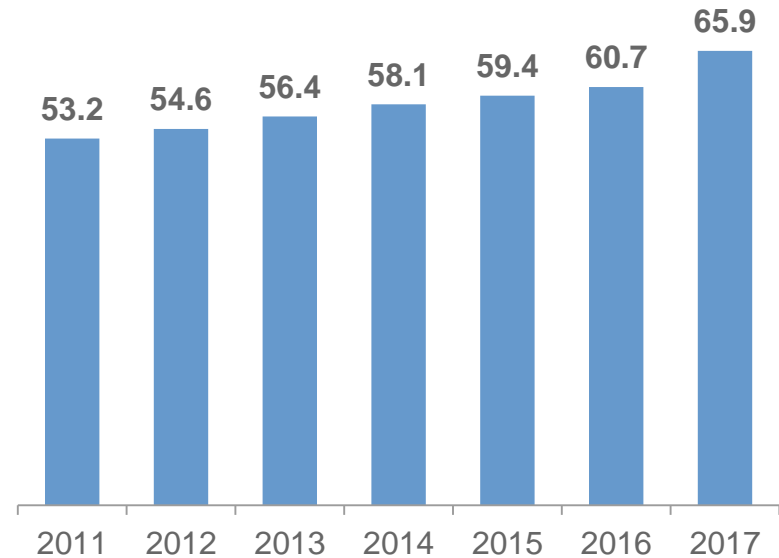

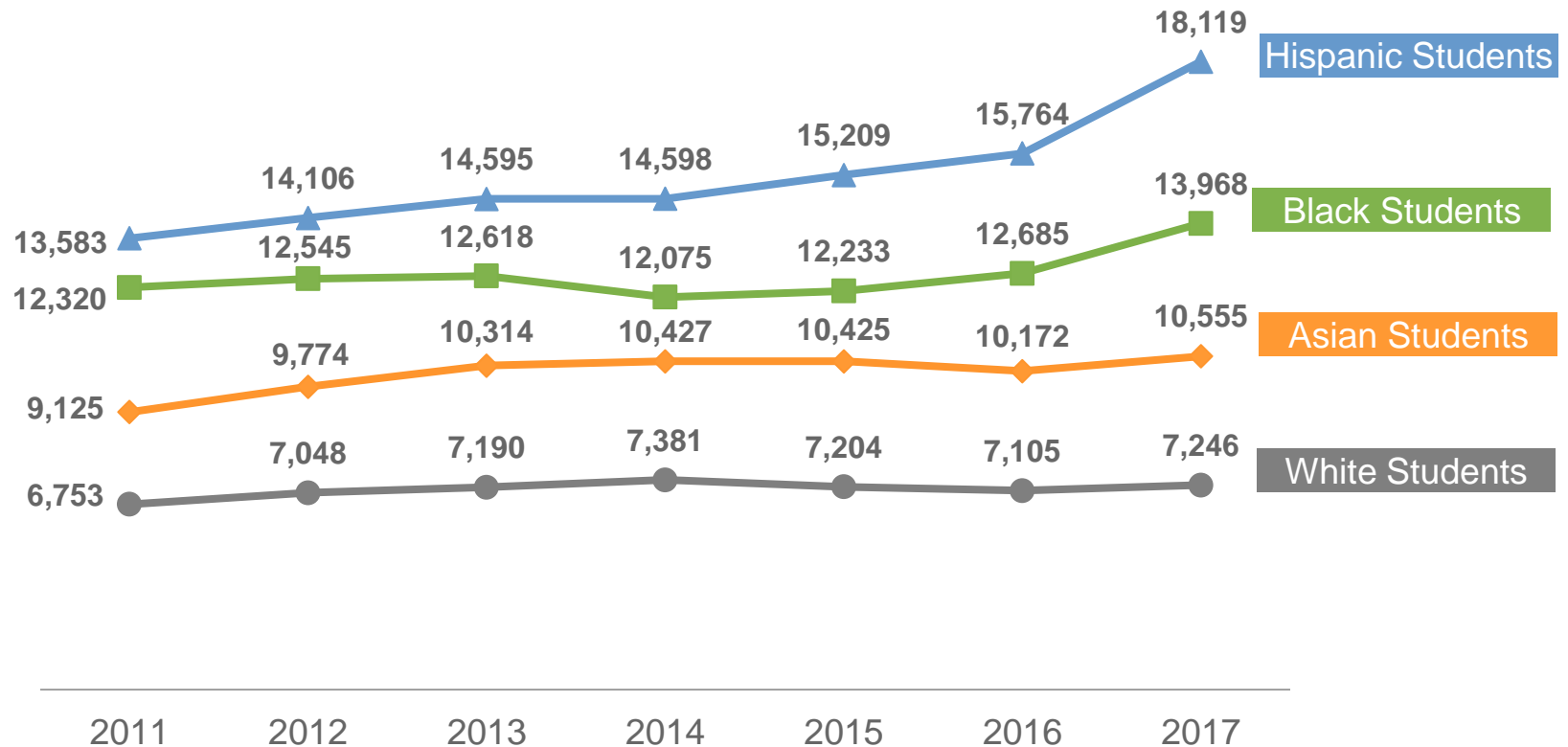

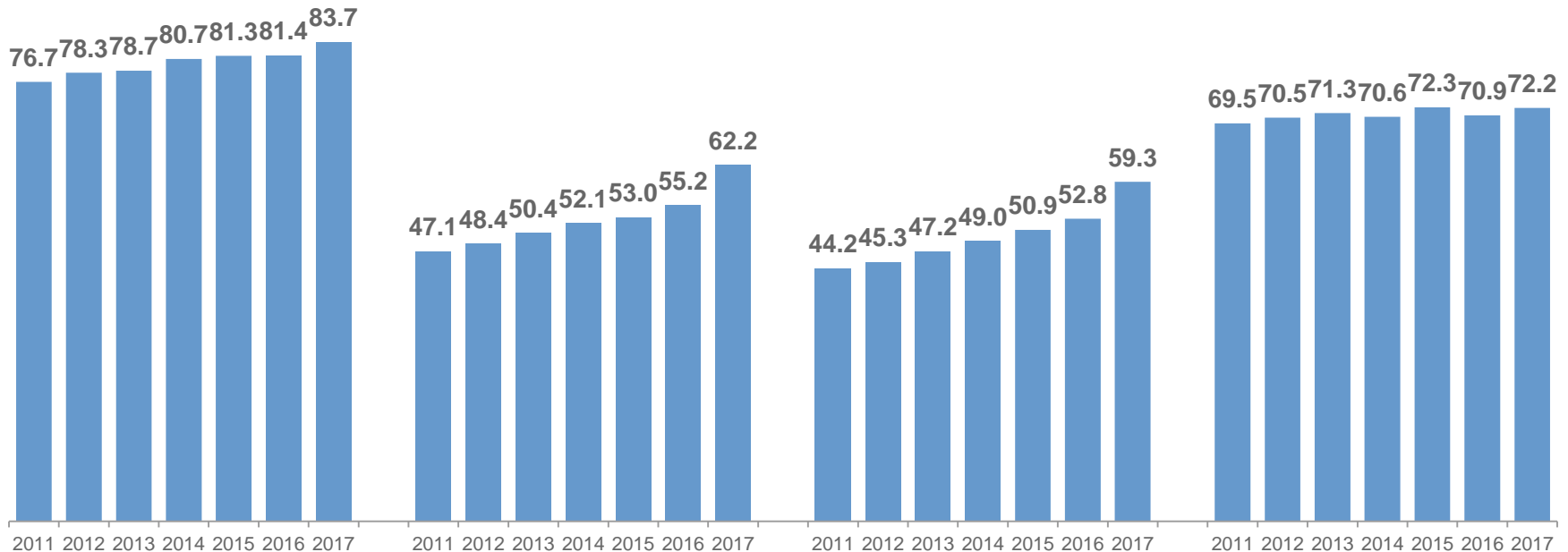

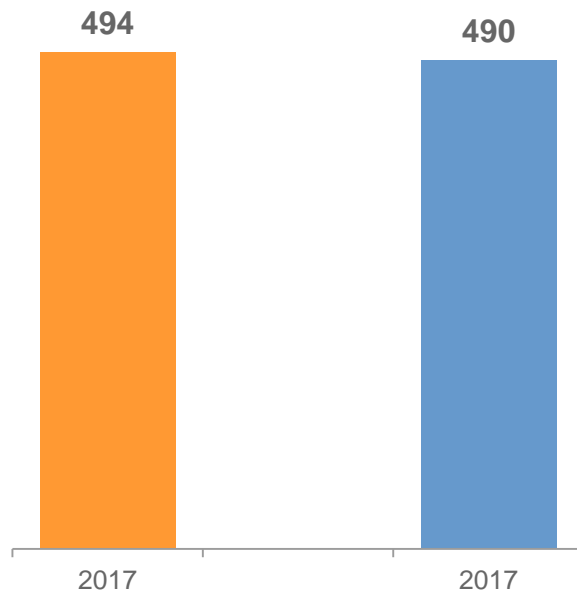

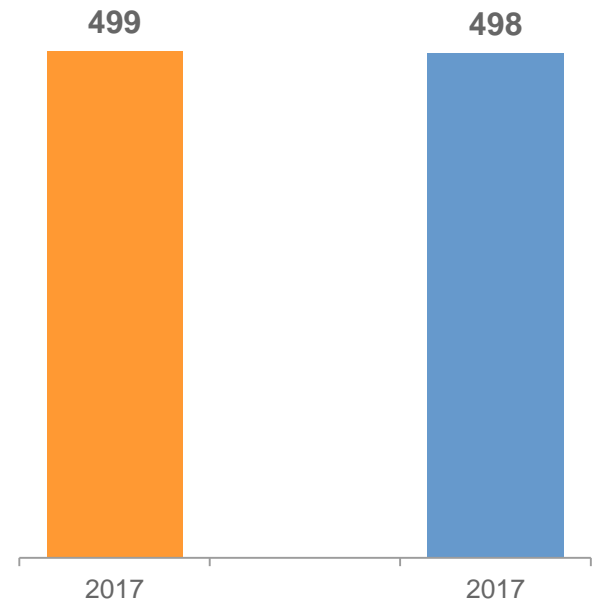

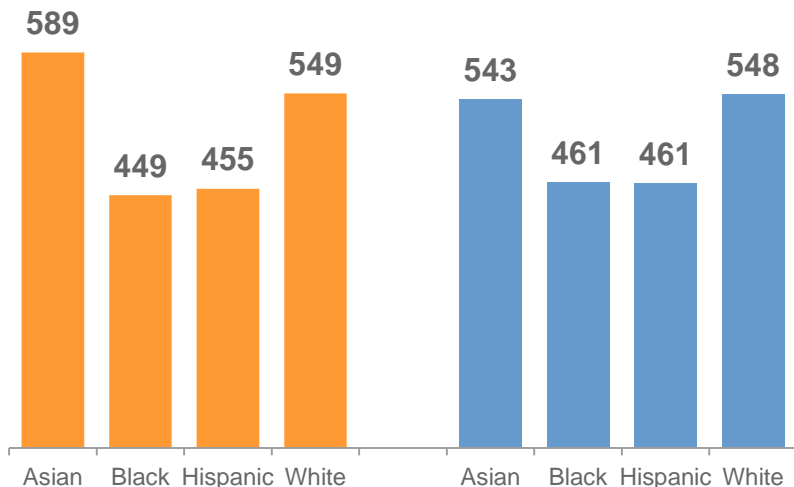
NYC SAT Performance by Subject for Juniors & Seniors by Ethnicity

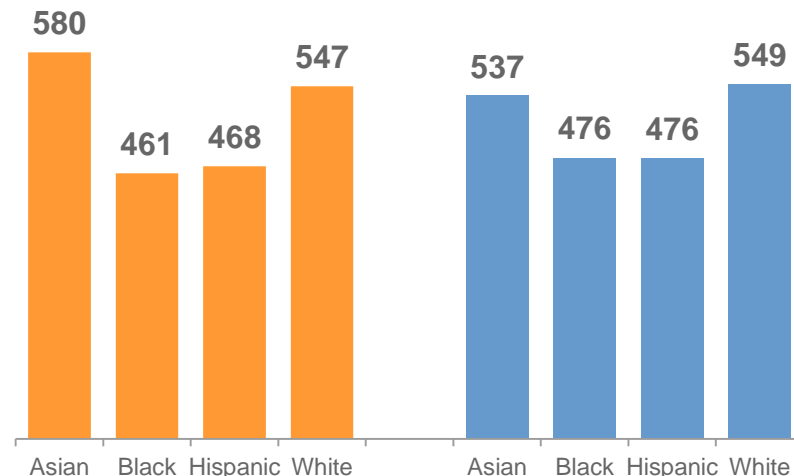
